### [Grants - over 1000 trees already pledged with up to 1000 more still available](#)

Old trees with deadwood and rot-holes provide amazing habitat in any orchard, but only planting new trees secures this habitat for the next hundred years. In autumn we launched an initiative to help restore orchards through 'gapping up' planting by sending out free grafting kits and funding purchased pre-grafted trees. This has been a great success with 1200 trees already promised.

### [Scion swap](#)

If you are keen to give grafting a go, (which is a lot easier than it sounds!), then you'll need scionwood. Come along on 28th February to the 8th National Springtime Swap Scionwood in Buckingham, hosted by the Mid-Shires Orchard Group, where you will be able to swap or buy from a huge range of varieties of apple, plum, cherry and pear. These can be grafted onto rootstocks on the day, or be taken home for grafting yourself.

### **FruitFinder**

With thousands of fruit varieties in the UK, it can be hard to know where to start if you are looking for a new tree or planting an orchard. There are many fruit varieties which have historical associations with particular places. Some have been bred or discovered in an area and are named after a place or person. We are in the process of creating a database that will provide information about where varieties were raised or discovered as well as other information like culinary use. There will be a distribution map showing the areas where they are currently growing so you can find varieties that may perform well in your area. Where available, it will provide links of where you will be able to buy trees of these varieties, or obtain graftwood so that you can graft your own.
