
A stag beetles head and pronotum (the top part of the thorax) are shiny black and its wing cases are chestnut brown.



Females have small jaws and are much smaller overall (about 3 to 5cm long). They can be seen on the ground looking for somewhere to lay their eggs.

Lesser stag beetles are much smaller (up to 3cm) and are matt black all over. The males and females are much more similar but they can still be told apart if you have a keen eye. A large lesser stag beetle can be confused with a small female stag beetle.
